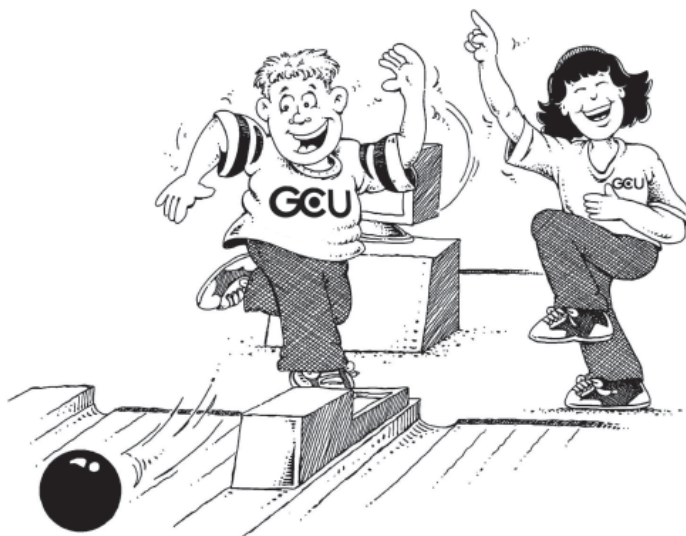

RULES

1. Entrant must be a member of the Greek Catholic Union of the U.S.A. in good standing.
2. Competition is according to age groups: 2-3, 4-5, 6-7, 8-9, 10-12, 13-15, and 16-18.
3. Bumpers used ages 2 through 7.
4. Ages 2-3 bowl 1 game, ages 4-7 bowl 2 games and ages 8-18 bowl 3 games.
5. Age of the participant shall be determined as of May 31, 2012.
6. District leaders shall be forwarded to the GCU Home Office to determine National Champions.
7. The highest score for the 16-18 year olds, male and female, will be eligible for a \$1,000 GCU Education Scholarship. (*Complete rules for the Scholarship appear on back of this application.*)
8. Good sportsmanship is to be observed at all times during the competition.

Eligibility for Bowling Educational Scholarship

Eligibility: Each youth must:

- 1) be between the ages of 16 and 18 as of May 31;
- 2) be the official winner or qualified alternate of their respective district's tournament as certified by the District Athletic Director;
- 3) be a GCU benefit member for a minimum of five years, and
- 4) at the time of the district tournament has a permanent life policy or an annuity product with a minimum average balance of \$2,000.00 (a term policy will not be considered);
- 5) competition must be completed by May 31, 2012.

Rules and Procedures to Determine Bowling Educational Scholarship Winners

Rules and Procedures: The Bowling Educational Scholarship will be determined by using the district winner's three game actual total plus handicap. Handicap will be based on the three game total rolled in the district. This total will be added and then divided by three to determine the average. The male's average will be subtracted from 225 and the handicap will be calculated at 90% of the difference between the average and 225. For example, with an average of 175 we would subtract 175 from 225, which would be 50. Then we would take 90% of 50, which is 45 pins x 3. So, 135 pins would be added to the actual score. The female's handicap will be calculated in the same manner using 200 as the basis.

The highest score among all eligible entrants will deter-

mine the female and male scholarship winners. In the event of a tie, winners will share the scholarship.

If a bowler has an established league average, that average must be used for handicap purposes. The handicap must be submitted to the Home Office.

No cash prizes will be awarded. The male and female winners will receive a certificate worth \$1,000 to be paid directly to the student upon receipt by the Home Office of a tuition bill from either a college, university, or other post-secondary school.

If a male or female less than 18 years of age wins the scholarship, they will not be eligible to win the bowling scholarship in any succeeding year.
